Online fame

-ASK ROSIE-----

Surely blogging or vlogging must be one of the easiest ways of finding fame and fortune? All you need is a computer and a hobby to talk about, don't you? Well, although it looks simple, being a success in the blogosphere is actually a lot more difficult than it seems.

Kate Ross has been advising brands on how to work with bloggers and vloggers, and believes that if you start a blog or vlog just to earn money, it isn't going to work. Kate says you need to be passionate about your topic and you need to provide your readers or viewers with interesting content. If you don't, your vlog or blog isn't going to get positive feedback and attract subscribers.

You also need to be aware that cash isn't going to come rolling in overnight. Seventeen-year-old Rosie Bea, who has a YouTube fashion channel, says her blog only started attracting the attention of advertisers after she had put in months and months of unpaid work and built up a big fan base. Rosie was also combining her vlog work with her law studies, and she advises vloggers in the same position to make sure that they plan carefully so that they have time to do both things properly.

So, while the tabloid press often talks about the instant success of young bloggers and vloggers, it isn't really instant at all. The people who are successful have done well because they are hard-working and passionate about what they do, and it is this dedication and passion that attracts subscribers and advertisers to them. The press is only interested in them once they are in the public eye, but they have achieved their celebrity status through hours and hours of hard work.

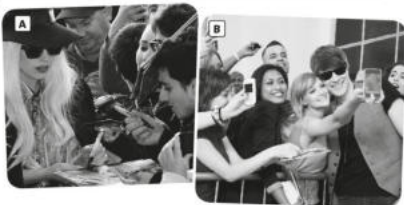

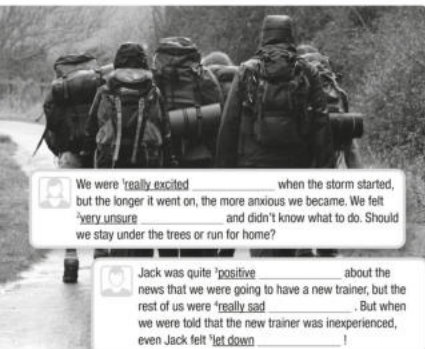

Robo-Cops

Police forces have always used technology to help them combat crime, but as collecting data and storing it becomes much easier, more and more police forces are using it to improve crime prevention and therefore to predict crime before it happens.

A Crime prevention software called PredPol helps the police predict where crimes are likely to occur. The software analyses years of data on the location, time and nature of crimes committed and predicts where and when crime is most likely to occur in the future. Police officers receive this information on the computers in their cars and they then spend more time in these areas. As a result, the increased police presence in these neighbourhoods has cut crime significantly. Crime figures for one area of Los Angeles, USA, were reduced by 12% in 2011 when police officers used crime prediction software. In the same year, burglaries were cut by 26% in Manchester, UK, using the same methods.

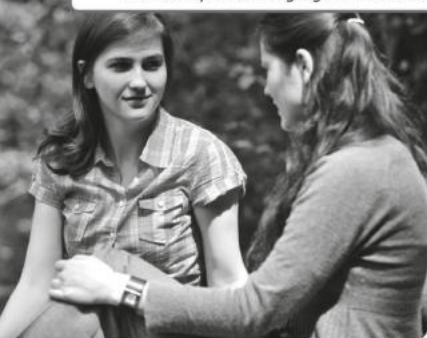
B As well as software that predicts crime, companies are also developing technology that will help police patrols catch criminals before they can leave town. By combining information such as the places where crimes frequently take place with the routes that allow the fastest escape, computers will direct patrols to where they can arrest criminals.

C However, although the makers of this technology claim it will help reduce crime rates, some people are not so sure. Not all crime is reported and if the police just focus on the neighbourhoods where most crime occurs, they will neglect others. Some experts claim that if police officers just pay attention to the information that has been stored in their devices, crime rates could actually rise in some areas.

Dying for a selfie

Most of us have taken a selfie at one time or another, be it a photo of ourselves in a beautiful place, during a performance by our favourite band, or on a memorable night out with friends. Even monarchs, prime ministers and presidents have been seen in the news grinning inanely at the screen of a smartphone. ¹ _____

In several cases, this action has had disastrous consequences.

Take, for example, the Spaniard who was killed by a bull while he was taking a selfie during the annual bull run in a village near his hometown. ² _____ Incidents such as these have led to the death toll from selfie-related incidents reaching double figures for the first time in 2015, overtaking the number of victims of shark attacks. BOOK REVIEW

The Kite Runner by Khaled Hosseini



Khaled Hosseini's first novel, *The Kite Runner*, is a powerful story of friendship, betrayal and suffering. It is set in Kabul, the capital of Afghanistan, in the seventies, then a relatively liberal and open-minded city. ¹

Although the novel describes dramatic political events, it is Amir's close friendship with Hassan, the son of his father's servant, which catches our attention. Hassan serves his friend breakfast every morning and then stays to clean the house while Amir is driven to school. Hassan does not resent his friend's much more comfortable life and he is a loyal companion. However, Amir betrays him, an act that will make Amir feel guilty even when he and his father have escaped to America and left Hassan and the war behind. ² It is a journey that takes him back to his home country and forces him to face the suffering that the people he left behind have to live with.

Hosseini describes Afghanistan in a way that brings the country to life, and his writing style is always clear and easy to follow. The story moves along at a fast pace and takes us on an incredibly exciting journey from the joy and happiness of the boys' youth to the anxiety and fear of the war. ³ Hosseini has demonstrated great skill in managing to take such a complicated theme and produce a novel that readers all over the world find hard to put down.

The Kite Runner is a dramatic novel that is full of action and emotion and that, despite the war that erupts and destroys people's lives, offers hope. ⁴ Much of the story is set in a country that has suffered greatly, but the ending suggests that there might be a better future both for the characters and for Afghanistan. One can only hope that this is the case.

The rise of Airbnb

In 2007, design graduates, Joe Gebbie and Brian Chesky, were struggling to pay the rent for their San Francisco apartment. When they heard that there was a conference coming to town and there were no hotel rooms available, they came up with the idea of putting their living room floor up for rent. The next day, they created the website airbedandbreakfast.com where they advertised three airbeds in their home at \$80 each a night, breakfast included. Only six days later, they had three guests sleeping on their floor. They knew immediately that this was the start of something big.

Being budding entrepreneurs, the pair decided to take their idea further. They enlisted Gebbie's former flatmate, Nathan Blecharczyk, a computer science graduate, to develop their website. Their idea was to target conferences and festivals across the USA, getting local people to list their rooms and travellers to book them. The new website was completed just in time for the 2008 Democratic National Convention in Denver, at which Barack Obama was due to speak in front of 80,000 people. Within a week, they had 800 listings, an achievement which dealt in part with the shortage of hotel rooms, but did not solve their financial problems, as the site was not making any money.

The team decided that they would have to handle payment for the bookings if they were to make their venture financially viable. They began to charge three per cent to the host and between six and twelve per cent to the traveller, depending on the price of the booking. Meanwhile, investors had started showing interest in the company. By April 2009, Gebbie, Chesky and Blecharczyk were making enough money to cover their living expenses. When larger investments began to arrive, they moved the company out of their flat into a new state-of-the-art office and hired more staff.

Airbnb hit one million bookings in January 2011, and since then it has gone from strength to strength. It hasn't been plain sailing, however. When one host complained on her blog later that year that her house had been trashed by an Airbnb renter, the story was reported internationally in the press. The company responded by announcing that in future hosts would be insured and there would be a 24/7 manned helpline to deal with any complaints. A month later, another victim of vandalism was compensated immediately and has gone on to rent out his apartment through the website again. Thanks to quick thinking like this, the company now has over 1.5 million listings in 34,000 cities in 190 countries, and is rumoured to be worth around \$20 billion.

A Although couples will rarely believe it, scientific factors have a lot to do with falling in love. Research has shown that scent plays an important role in choosing a mate.

Other experiments have demonstrated that love is caused by combinations of chemicals in the brain. Furthermore, New York psychologist Arthur Aron applied the principles of science to demonstrate that the process of falling in love could be speeded up ... to just 45 minutes!

B Some scientists claim that we take between ninety seconds and four minutes to decide if we fancy someone. However, the lean from being attracted to someone to falling in love with them is a big one, and Aron wanted to find out if the closeness associated with feelings of being in love could be created artificially.

C Aron produced a paper that included 36 questions designed to encourage intimacy if couples answered them together. The questions came in three sets with each set covering increasingly intimate ground. They covered many personal opinions and experiences; for

example, "Would you like to be famous?", "What does friendship mean to you?" and "When did you last cry in front of another person?" After answering the questions together, the couples were directed to stare into each other's eyes for four minutes without saying anything.

D Aron tested his questions on pairs of strangers and then asked them to stare at each other. All of the participants reported feeling close to their partners and many of them swapped contact details after the experiment. So if you're keen on someone and would like to get closer to them, it would seem that Aron's questions could help you to achieve your objective.

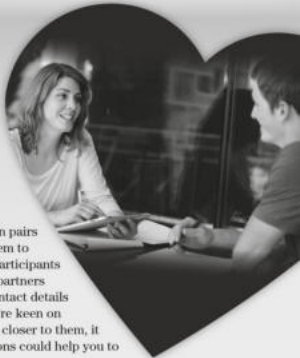

THE INSECTS ARE COMING!



With an abundance of cheap food and a weakness for junk food, the dietary habits of many Americans (and people in other Western countries) have led to an obesity epidemic. As a result, a growing number of food experts are saying it's time to replace traditional dishes with more nutritious and also more economical and ecological dishes: dishes that contain insects.

If you put a plate of bugs (as insects are often called in the USA) in front of an American, they, like most Westerners, would probably refuse to eat them. Insects are seen as pests that destroy food crops rather than delicacies to be eaten. ¹ The challenge for the promoters of insect-based meals is to make Americans see them in the same way.

During the 20th century, if you had visited a research department at an American food and agricultural university, you would have heard about how they were trying to reduce insect numbers due to the negative impact they have on crops and seeds. ² Furthermore, insect fairs such as the BugFest at the North Carolina Museum or The Great Insect Fair at Penn State University explain that grasshoppers, moths and their cousins are an excellent source of nutrients like protein, minerals and vitamins. The fairs also offer the more adventurous visitors 'bug banquets', which serve mouth-watering insect dishes.

Apart from the scientific community, a growing number of market stalls and restaurants are providing insect meals too. ³ What is more, fans of insect-based cooking like Daniella Martin are spreading the word that bugs are good for you. Martin's blog *Girl Meets Bug*, her internet cooking videos and her newspaper columns are all contributing to changing Americans' perceptions of insects. ⁴ While entomophagists (people who eat insects) agree they face an uphill struggle, with 70 million obese citizens and millions more who want to be environmentally friendly, it seems that this could be the right time for insects to invade America's kitchens.

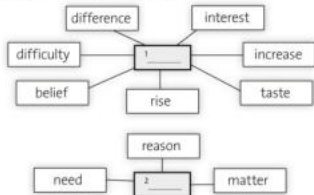

'Ladies and gentlemen, I have a grave announcement to make. Incredible as it may seem . . . those strange beings who landed in the Jersey farmlands tonight are . . . an invading army from the planet Mars.'

This announcement in 1934 supposedly scared a million Americans into believing that thousands of their fellow citizens were fighting for their lives against giant aliens. It came from a radio play, read by Orson Welles, that was based on HG Wells's famous 1898 novel *The War of the Worlds*, and it has become an American media legend. However, as we all know, legends are rarely based on the truth.

The arrival of the radio in the 1930s provided people with an exciting new channel of communication – but it also provided newspapers with unwanted competition. Throughout the decade, more and more people had come to rely on the radio for news, and newspapers had been losing income from advertising. In addition, many people were worried about its possible use as a form of mind control. *The War of the Worlds* gave newspapers the perfect excuse to exploit these fears and attack their rival as irresponsible. The day after the play was broadcast, newspaper front pages claimed the radio play had caused panic across the country, with people rioting and even committing suicide. However, the stories were fabricated and completely false. Recent research has shown that most people were listening to another radio station that evening, and there are no records of mass hysteria.

The newspapers of the time wanted the public to believe that new technology could not be trusted, and they did an extremely good job. For decades, the story of people's reaction to *The War of the Worlds* was seen as an example of how the media could cause panic. It is only now that researchers are realising that the whole episode is an example of something even more worrying: it shows how the media could fabricate and maintain a lie for nearly a century.

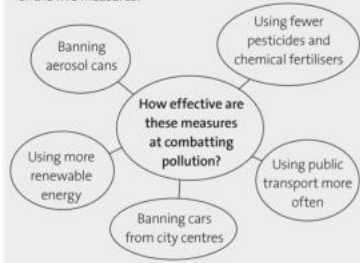

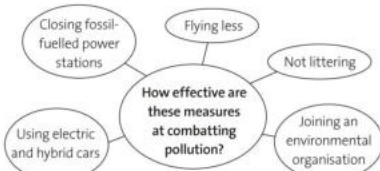

Boston Tea Party

On the cold winter night of 16 December 1773, a group of American colonists approached three British ships anchored in Boston harbour. ¹ _____. Once they had boarded the vessels and located the tea that the ships were carrying, they proceeded to empty all 342 of the chests into the sea, destroying their contents forever. At the time, they may not have been aware of the far-reaching implications their actions would have.

The protest, which came to be known as the Boston Tea Party, had its roots in the growing friction between the North American colonists and the British Parliament over the question of taxation. According to the colonists, the British had no right to make them pay taxes as the colonists were not represented in parliament. ² _____. Things came to a head on 10 May 1773 when the Tea Act was passed, which required colonists to purchase only British tea. Although cheaper than other teas, this tea was taxed, a fact that the colonists refused to tolerate.

In New York, Philadelphia and Charleston, the colonists had managed to persuade the authorities to reject the tea shipments that had arrived, forcing the ships to return to Britain. ³ _____. It was the tea that was the cause of their complaint, not the ships, so it was the tea that the colonists destroyed. After three hours, 45 tons of it had been dumped into the harbour, a quantity that would be worth around a million dollars today. Not surprisingly, the British were furious.

In response to the action, Parliament passed a set of laws known as the Coercive Acts in an attempt to assert more control over the Boston settlement. The measure had the opposite effect, however, and only succeeded in provoking the other colonies in the area. ⁴ _____. This eventually culminated in the American War of Independence (1775–1783), which led to the creation of the nation we now know as the United States of America. It was the Boston Tea Party that set the wheels of independence in motion.

- A However, the governor in Boston refused to cooperate, so the colonists took matters into their own hands.
- B So as not to reveal their identity, some of them were disguised as Native Americans.
- C Owing to the popularity of tea in Europe, rival companies had been set up to import tea from China.

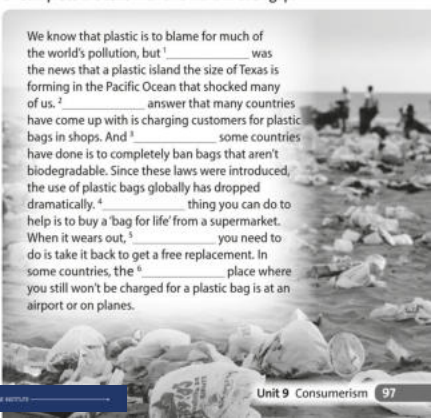

THE *kings* OF THE SHOPPING MALL

It was on 22 March 1954 that the world's first shopping mall, Northland, opened. Built in a suburb of Chicago, USA, the designer of Northland, Victor Gruen, told the press that it was the 'shopping centre of the future'. Gruen was half-right, because although Northland was the world's first purpose-built shopping centre, it was his next design, Southdale in Minnesota, that became the model that architects all over the world would copy. Opened two years after Northland, Southdale was the first shopping centre where the shops were enclosed in one enormous building, and shopping mall architects have followed Gruen's model ever since.¹

However, if Victor Gruen invented the mall, businessman Alfred Taubman perfected it. Taubman took Gruen's design and added a few rules to encourage consumers to spend as much money as possible. Taubman decided that shops should only occupy two floors. Furthermore, the escalators to move shoppers between the floors should always be at the two ends of the mall, forcing people to walk past all the shops on a floor. He also insisted on glass safety barriers on the first floor, allowing consumers to easily see the shops above and below them, and on opening up the front of shops completely by removing their big glass windows.² Taubman also wanted shoppers to spend as much time as possible in the malls so they would spend more money. He suggested letting plenty of natural light into them by constructing huge glass ceilings. Taubman also installed artificial lights next to the glass ceilings, so that as daylight faded, the artificial light increased and shoppers were unaware of the passing of time. Holding different events every week and local festivals in the space inside the mall would bring in even more people.³

Today, shopping malls have grown to the size of small towns and contain a lot of leisure facilities such as theme parks, artificial lakes and even ski slopes to attract customers.

⁴ However, although shopping malls are carefully designed to make consumers part with as much of their money as possible, it is unlikely that they will notice. Many people see a visit to a shopping mall as a leisure activity and that is perhaps Taubman's biggest legacy.

Secondly, they could look for casual jobs like babysitting or dog walking, which can be **turned down** if schoolwork is **pressing**. Finally, teenagers could work in the holidays rather than school time.

I believe that these suggestions would help teenagers **retain** the benefits of extra money from working, without putting their studies at risk.

Finding the right face

You'd think it would be quite straightforward to choose a historical figure to include on a banknote, wouldn't you? Of course, the current monarch needs to be on the front of the note; the problem is who should appear on the back. Back in 1970, when the Bank of England began featuring past celebrities on its £5, £10, £20 and £50 notes, nobody used to question the choices. But that changed in 2013, when it was announced that the £10 note was going to be redesigned.

Just before this announcement, former British Prime Minister Winston Churchill had been chosen to replace prison reformer Elizabeth Fry on the new £5 note. The fact that there were now no women on the back of the banknotes made a woman the logical choice for the £10 note. Feminist activist Caroline Criado-Perez led a campaign to put pressure on the Bank of England to choose the novelist Jane Austen for the note. Criado-Perez and her supporters organised protests, sent out an online petition – signed by 35,000 people – and threatened legal action if their demands were not met.

This was only the start of the trouble, however. On the day the Bank of England announced that the new £10 note would, indeed, feature the author, social media sites were flooded with angry comments. There were attacks on the Bank of England for being too cautious in their choice, attacks on Jane Austen for being old-fashioned and, worse still, personal attacks on Criado-Perez and her supporters for promoting the choice of a woman. When she began to receive death threats, the activist closed her Twitter account.

In response to the incident, the Bank of England announced that it would review the selection process in order to avoid such ugly reactions in future. Since then, a special committee has been set up to deal with the process. From now on, whenever a banknote has to be changed, the committee will choose a particular field, for example the visual arts, and the public will have two months to send in ideas. After that, a shortlist of candidates will be compiled and the governor of the Bank of England will choose a character from the list.

Meanwhile, plans for the Jane Austen banknote are going ahead. The new design features a portrait of the author, adapted from a sketch by her sister, Cassandra. In the centre of the note are the author's writing table and an image of her brother's house, which was the inspiration for a number of novels. There is also an illustration of one of Jane's characters, Elizabeth Bennet, and a quotation from one of her books. It can only be hoped that the final banknote meets with less opposition than its announcement did.

Using modern technology to preserve an ancient language

Monday 30 December 2013 was a tragic day for the people of the Chickasaw Nation. It was the day on which a 93-year-old member of the tribe called Emily Johnson Dickerson passed away. But Emily wasn't just any old member of the tribe. '... Through her death, the tribe lost not only a beloved member of their extended family, but also a valuable source of knowledge about their language and culture.

The Chickasaw Nation is made up of around 57,000 people, most of whom live in the thirteen areas of Oklahoma, USA, that were once designated 'Indian Territory'. Their land is largely rural, but much of their way of life is modern – they use mobile phones, drive cars and have access to the internet. Some of the traditional Chickasaw customs have died out, such as native folk medicine. ² The Chickasaw people are determined that their language should also continue.

There are currently 175 Native American languages spoken in the USA, but fewer than twenty are expected to survive the next one hundred years. The language of the Chickasaws, known as 'Chikashshanompa', has been in existence for well over three thousand years, but it is now in danger of disappearing. Young Chickasaws sent to government boarding schools in the past were discouraged from speaking their language and were obliged to learn English to negotiate with people outside the tribe. ³ Which is where the Chickasaw Language Revitalisation Programme comes in.

The aim of the programme is to keep the culture, language and oral traditions of the tribe alive, and it is using cutting-edge technology to do this. First, there is Chickasaw TV, an online network with a channel dedicated to learning the Chickasaw language through lessons, songs, games and stories. ⁴ But the programme's most remarkable achievement is its app: Chickasaw Language Basics. The app features hundreds of Chickasaw words, phrases, songs and videos, and it is the first of its kind to be developed by a tribe or a nation.

According to Joseph Hinson, director of the Department of Chickasaw Language, the Chickasaw are 'a pretty hard-headed, persistent people.' ⁵ The fifty-thousand-year-old indigenous Native American tribe has survived the Conquistadores, numerous wars with Europeans, the American Civil War, and compulsory removal from their native lands... and they're still here. One can only hope that the massive effort the tribe is putting into preserving their language succeeds, so that Chikashshanompa is not lost to the world forever.

Researchers at the department of neuroscience at University College London ¹ the limits of personal space. This is the area around a person which determines whether he or she is comfortable with the closeness of another person or whether the distance is causing them to feel ². Three monumental meetings in history

A

On 4 May 1904, a meeting was held between two British businessmen that resulted in one of the most famous automobile partnerships in history. After purchasing a car whose performance he was dissatisfied with, Frederick Henry Royce had succeeded in creating his own model that gave the occupants a quieter and smoother ride. One of these vehicles was purchased by Royce's colleague Henry Edmunds, who was friends with a car dealer in London called Charles Stewart Rolls. Edmunds showed Rolls his new car and arranged for Rolls and Royce to meet over lunch at the Midland Hotel in Manchester. The two men began doing business together, and on 15 March 1906, Rolls-Royce Limited was born. Unfortunately, the partnership ended rather abruptly four years later when Rolls was killed in a plane crash. However, the company continued, and the Rolls-Royce went on to become arguably one of the best cars in the world.

B On 17 July 1975, a meeting occurred that a few years earlier would have been unthinkable. On that day, US astronaut Thomas Stafford and Russian cosmonaut Alexei Leonov exchanged the first international handshake in space. The Apollo-Soyuz Test Project, named after the two spacecraft involved, was a joint venture organised by the US and Soviet governments to demonstrate the improved relations between the two nations. The Apollo and the Soyuz were launched on 15 July within seven and a half hours of each other, and they met over France, where the two spacecraft joined. They stayed connected for nearly two days, long enough for the three Americans and two Soviets to visit each other's ships, conduct experiments together, share meals and converse in each other's languages. One of the gifts they exchanged was a bag of tree seeds which were later planted in the two countries.

C On 27 March 1997, a rather awkward meeting took place before the press in a Tennessee state prison hospital. The participants were two men: Dexter King, son of the murdered civil rights activist Martin Luther King, and James Earl Ray, the man who had been convicted of the assassination. King was 36 when the meeting happened, and Ray was 69 and very sick – he had to be taken to the meeting room in a wheelchair. During the 25 minutes the two men spent together, King asked Ray if he had killed King's father. Ray, who confessed to the killing at the time of his arrest, but then withdrew his confession, replied that he hadn't, to which King responded, 'I believe you.'

Whether Ray was the killer or the murder was a government conspiracy will always remain a mystery because Ray died of liver disease a year later in prison.

Who are you?



On 6 June 2011, the media reported the kidnapping of a female Syrian-American blogger called Amina Arraf. Regarded as a daring political rebel, the 35-year-old had become popular for her blogs protesting about the lack of freedom in Syria, where she was supposedly living at the time. Yet only two days after her disappearance, it was discovered that Amina had never existed at all. She was a fictional character created by a forty-year-old American man called Tom MacMaster, a PhD student at the University of Edinburgh.

MacMaster's invention of the blogger is an example of sock puppetry: the use of false identities to deceive others. The false identity is known as a sock puppet, and its creator, a puppet master. MacMaster created Amina to enable him to express his strong views on Middle-Eastern affairs without offending other Americans, who may not have approved. Writing as Amina Arraf gave him the authority to be able to say what he wanted to. But this is not the only reason for using sock puppetry.

At the turn of the millennium, an American woman named Debbie Swenson created the fictional character Kaycee Nicole, a teenage girl suffering from terminal cancer. Her blog, *Living Colours*, described in detail Kaycee's fight for survival, and it attracted millions of readers. When Kaycee 'died' on 14 May 2001, her fans were devastated. But their distress turned to anger when they discovered that Kaycee was not a real person. The character had been developed by Ms Swenson to get the attention and sympathy she craved.

Don't be deceived!

Celebrated in many countries on 1 April, April Fools Day is a day on which people are encouraged ¹ practical jokes on their friends and family. While Amina and Kaycee were used as a means to meet the needs of their creators, other identities have been invented to make a profit. American gun advocate John Lott made up a fake student, Mary Rosh, to defend his writing online and give him positive reviews. Mystery writer RJ Ellory went further and fabricated a whole team of sock puppets, not only to praise his own books, but also to criticise those of his rivals. Well-respected British historian Orlando Figes lost face completely when he had to publicly apologise for doing the same.

Yet none of these stories can compete with the large-scale sock puppetry in existence today. It is understood that the New York City Police Department has several false identities hanging out on social media sites in order to catch criminals. The US military is said to have a number of sock puppets online searching for potential terrorists. While most of us are unlikely to have dealings with these organisations, the stories of Amina, Kaycee and the fake reviewers are much closer to home. It is clear that the internet is a minefield today and we all have to step very carefully in order not to get hurt.

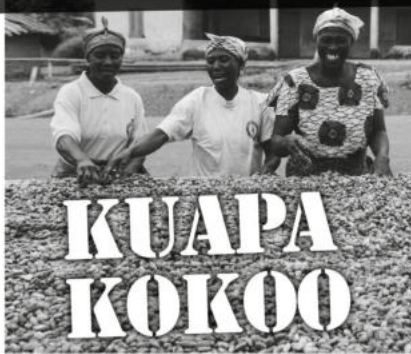

SUCCESSFUL ETHICAL TRADING:



Most people in the cocoa business used to laugh at the idea that farmers could have their own company. That was before the cocoa farmers' co-operative Kuapa Kokoo – literally 'best farmer cocoa' – was established in Ghana in 1993. ¹ It is one of the most successful members of the fair trade group, the movement that promotes ethical trading. But the situation hasn't always been like this.

International development agencies became aware of the need for a company protecting small farmers in Ghana when the government was obliged to hand over control of the cocoa trade to private companies. Kuapa Kokoo was set up under the management of Nana Frimpong, who was an engineer and a farmer, and also a friend of the Ghanaian President. ² Kuapa Kokoo now had a base and a team.

The first challenge facing the new company was corruption, which the management refused to tolerate. First, they made contact with independent recorders in each village – that is, the people who manage the relationship with the farmers and take the cocoa to be weighed.

³ Finally, they trained the recorders to the same level as the government's quality control officers,

who had previously looked down on them and declared the produce low quality unless they were given a 'tip'. It looked as if Kuapa Kokoo was ready to do business.

The next problem was money – or lack of it. The cheques the company had been planning to pay the farmers with could not be exchanged for cash because the regional banks had run out of banknotes. So the Kuapa management had to withdraw from the bank in Ghanaian currency most of the £100,000 loan they had been given. Because of the competitive trading environment in the villages at the time, there was much confusion over the cocoa that had been promised to each company.⁴ The first season had been an absolute disaster.

Fortunately, the company had the support of the agencies to try again the following year.⁵ The company's new 'Pick Up and Pay' system, by which the recorders from each village would collect the cocoa and receive payment for it every two weeks, was a success. At the end of the second season, Kuapa Kokoo was officially identified as the most efficient of the new cocoa companies. Since then, it has never looked back.

Young people today only care about social media, music and fashion – or at least, that's the impression you get from the media. But in fact, this description is far from the truth. The first reason is the simplest: most teenagers are still too young to vote, so why should they take an interest in party politics? But there are other factors too. When young people look at traditional politics, they don't find answers to the questions that are most important to them. How can we put an end to poverty? How can we save the world from pollution and global warming? But there are other organisations that address these topics directly. They arrange protests and other forms of activism. What is more, they use social media and the internet to publicise their campaigns, so it is easy for young people to find out about them.

Last month, I attended a protest against the building of a new retail park. Many of the protestors were under the age of twenty. We met near the proposed construction site and then marched into town, finishing outside the town hall. We stayed there all afternoon, giving out leaflets and talking to members of the public. It was a very successful protest and we even appeared on the local TV news.

It is perfectly possible for individuals to limit their own impact on the environment. For example, they should save electricity by switching off lights, computers and other electrical appliances when they are not using them. As far as possible, they should avoid buying products with plastic packaging and drink water from a reusable bottle.

In conclusion, I would say that we should all do what we can to prevent more damage to our environment. However, only time will tell whether this is enough to reverse the harm that has already been done.
